



Distinction between proceedings and journal papers

Conference proceedings provide a vehicle for rapid reporting of ideas, techniques, and results. It is not uncommon for these reports to be considered 'research in progress' and incomplete and inconclusive. The purposes of proceedings papers range from snapshots of recent or continuing work to the reporting of a completed work or project.

Journal papers are expected to be original, complete, and polished; to contain comparisons of theoretical and experimental results; and to include substantial conclusions and comprehensive references to other work.

Revision of conference proceedings manuscripts for journal submission

Many journals' publication policies permit manuscripts based partly or entirely on scientific content previously reported in a proceeding to be submitted to their journals.

In most cases, it is anticipated that the journal submission will represent a **substantively expanded**, refined, or otherwise revised manuscript relative to the proceedings paper to fully satisfy the standards of significance, originality, and presentation quality expected in a journal submission that is being considered for acceptance through the journal's paper peer-review process.

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Authors submitting to journals published by other publishers should verify that publisher's copyright and submission policies. That is, authors are encouraged to review the policies of the journals they are interested in submitting manuscripts: they are responsible for adhering to those copyright policies and may be expected to disclose the prior presentation or publication history of the submission.

MSA Publications

For the Microscopy Society of America (MSA), a proceedings manuscript submitted to an MSA journal **must incorporate revisions** over a prior or concurrent M&M proceedings paper to be considered for publication in an MSA journal and admitted into the peer-review process (provided the submission fulfills the requirements of significance, originality, and completeness expected in a journal submission).

For the MSA, it does not consider publication of an accepted journal article based on a prior proceedings paper to constitute double publication, provided substantial writing revisions are made (i.e. self-plagiarism is not acceptable). Exclusions will be made for methods/procedures text and figure legends.
